Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF) is National 4-H Council's premier leadership and civic engagement experience for high school students.

State delegates will experience Washington D.C. like never before by using the nation's capital as their classroom, connecting with young leaders from across the country and gaining the skills to become effective change agents.

During the CWF program week, delegates will:

- Strengthen communication, leadership, and civic engagement skills on a national level
- Understand the importance of Youth Voice and the skills necessary to make change in your community, such as civil discourse and media literacy
- Exchange ideas, practice respect, and form friendships with other youth from diverse backgrounds
- Experience hands-on learning using the historical backdrop of our nation's capital city, Washington, DC, as your classroom
- Create a plan and work with your fellow delegates to develop the steps to carry out the plan upon your return home, to make a difference in your community.

Monday – Day 2

FDR & MLK Memorials

On your first trip into the Nation's Capital, experience the monuments dedicated to two of our country's most important statesmen while exploring the majestic views of downtown Washington, DC.

Workshops focused on:

- How Civil Discourse is vital to becoming engaged and effective members of our communities and a healthy discussion about what we can do to revive civility and respect in our community while solving problems and working collaboratively.
- Media Literacy and its importance in being well informed as you prepare for constructive conversation and problem solving. We'll dive into practices for being responsible users of technology and critical consumers of the media you will use in your own communications and advocacy.
- Additional time for planning with your state delegation.

Night Tour of the monuments of the National Mall

For over 200 years, the National Mall has symbolized our nation and its democratic values, which have inspired the world. The National Mall - the great swath of green in the middle of our capital city and stretching from the foot of the United States Capitol to the Potomac River - is the premiere civic and symbolic space in our nation. You'll get the chance to explore:

- Jefferson Memorial
- Korean War Memorial
- Vietnam Veterans Memorial
- Lincoln Memorial
- WWII Memorial

Tuesday – Day 3

Arlington National Cemetery

The most famous cemetery in the country, is the final resting place for many of our nation's greatest heroes, including more than 300,000 veterans of every American conflict, from the Revolutionary War to Iraq and Afghanistan. Solemnly reflect on the sacrifices made by the men and women of the US Armed Forces and also have a chance to see the Changing of the Guard.

Town Hall

Delegates will have the opportunity to use their voice as they share their views on important national topics in a supportive, small group format with peers from all over the nation. Delegates will:

- Use active listening and media literacy skills to discuss national issues;
- Recognize how different geographic, demographic, and lived experiences may inform legitimate differences on a variety of national issues
- Come away with a broader understanding of many of the important issues facing our country today.

- Debriefing the Town Hall session and developing insights from each other after hearing diverse viewpoints from our peers from across the country
- Additional planning time for your delegation

Marine Corps Memorial

The United States Marine Corps War Memorial represents this nation's gratitude to Marines and those who have fought beside them. While the statue depicts one of the most famous incidents of World War II, the memorial is dedicated to all Marines who have given their lives in defense of the United States since 1775.

Twilight Tattoo (Weeks 1-4)

The U.S. Army's Twilight Tattoo is an action-packed military pageant featuring Soldiers from the U.S. Army Military District of Washington's ceremonial units, the 3d U.S. Infantry Regiment (The Old Guard) and The U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own."

Air Force/Pentagon Memorials (Weeks 5 & 6)

Take a night tour of the monuments in Arlington, overlooking Washington, DC, that honor the service of those in the US Air Force as well as those that lost their lives at the Pentagon during 9/11.

Thursday – Day 5

Delegation Day

Enjoy this time with your delegation, planned by your head coordinator, as you explore additional sites throughout the city. Many delegations take this time to enjoy the various Smithsonian Institute museums, Holocaust Museum, along with other great sites!
