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Are you a little puzzled about this Project Achievement thing?

4-H Project Achievement is a great way to teach someone something you have learned! You'll create a 4-H presentation while learning to research a project, organize your ideas in a logical order, and develop communication skills. You will also enjoy going to the Project Achievement competition where you will meet other 4-H'ers, experience getting in front of others to share what you have learned, and feel so accomplished by participating!

Georgia 4-H is a partner in public education and strives to incorporate state standards in the educational materials produced for in-school use. The following standards are correlated to the educational learning experience of 4-H Project Achievement.

So, you like animals? These projects are all about animals – from the farm to the wild! Your presentation may be about a type of animal and their home, what animals eat, how they stay safe, or what care they need. Your project suggestions are **Agricultural Awareness**, **Beef, Cat Care, Companion and Specialty Animals**, **Dairy, Dog Care and Training, Entomology, Fresh Water Fish and Shellfish, Herpetology, Horse, Ornithology, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep and Meat Goats, Swine, Veterinary Science, and Wildlife.**



Are you on the move, like to work with your hands, and enjoy building and/or repairing things? If so, your presentation could be about creating an item or fixing something. Your project suggestions are **Arts, Bicycle, Computer Information Technology and Data Science, Crafts, Engineering and Mechanics, Housing, Interior Design, Physical Science, Safety, Target Sports, and Workforce Preparation and Career Development.**



Whether it's outdoors, on vacation, or just free time activities, you probably like to have fun and relax! You might enjoy presenting about your hobbies, travels, performances, and/or fun activities through one of these projects: Bicycle; Current People, Places, and Events; Etiquette and Travel; Food for Health and Sport; General Recreation, Outdoor Recreation; Sports – Individual; Sports – Team; Outdoor Survival Skills; or Target Sports.

Nature and the environment are probably so fascinating to you! You likely enjoy exploring outdoors. Your presentation may be about how plants grow, natural habitats of wildlife, the importance of agriculture, or more! Your presentation suggestions are **Earth and Space Science; Entomology; Environmental Science;** Flowers, Shrubs, and Lawns; Forest Resources and Wood Science; Fresh Water Fish and Shellfish; Fruits, Vegetables, and Nuts; Life Science; Marine and Coastal Ecology; Physical Science; Plants, Soils, and Fertilizers; Agricultural Awareness; Outdoor Survival Skills; and Wildlife.



Do you like to "show off" what you know or entertain others? If so, you might enjoy these projects related to communicating and sharing. Your presentation may be about how to take photos, how to plan a dream vacation, or how to develop work readiness skills. You could choose to sing, dance, or play an instrument in a performing arts project. Project suggestions are **Arts; Communications; Crafts; Creative Stitchery;* Current People, Places, and Events; Etiquette and Travel; International; Agricultural Awareness; Performing Arts – General, Instrumental, or Vocal;* Photography and Videography; Public Speaking;* and Workforce Preparation and Career Development.**



You probably like shopping for, planning for, experimenting with, and/or eating food! Your presentation could include tips on making a dish or specific food. It might also be about germs, managing time, or planning a budget. Your project suggestions are **Dairy Foods, Food for Health and Sport, Food Safety and Preservation, Between Meal Snacks (food lab),* Food Fare (food lab),* Health, Life Science, Agricultural Awareness, and Time and Money Management.**



You probably enjoy your home, time with your friends and family, organizing or decorating your room, shopping, and/or keeping others safe. Your presentation may be about selecting items for you or your home or how to live a happier, safer life. Your project suggestions include **Clothing and Textiles**, **Creative Stitchery,* Health, Housing, Human Development, Interior Design, Safety, and Time and Money Management**.



Science or social studies is your jam! You'll likely enjoy projects about the past or about the world around us. You might consider a project related to a favorite person from history, a favorite science fair project, or uniqueness of our solar system. Consider one of the following projects: **Archaeology, Historic People, Historic Places and Events, Paleontology, Physical Science, or Earth and Space Sciences.**



Building a Speech with Arch

Now that you've picked your project and done your research, you are ready to put together your presentation. Arch the Dawg loves a good burger with lots of extras added, so follow his recipe to build your speech.



Gets the audience's attention (give a quote or surprising fact, ask a question, relate a personal experience, etc.) **Make sure the audience knows what the speech is about!**

Descriptive words, like adjectives, give a speech that little "extra" flavor that is needed to make it appealing. Just like "extras" added to Arch's burger!


Where you get into the "meat" or **the most important part of your speech**. List **3-5 main points or big ideas** you want to make about the topic. You will expand these big ideas using information from your research. Without the meat you don't have a hamburger. **Without the body, you don't have a speech**!

Visual aids help give the audience another dimension to better understand your speech and keep their attention! Visual Aids might be posters, slides or props.

Expression in your speech encourages your audience to listen!

A speech would be left hanging without the conclusion. Review the main points, tell the audience what action you want them to take, and relate back to the introduction.


Planning Your Visual Aids

Your presentation isn't just what you say, it's how you say it, how you illustrate it, and how you present yourself. In addition to learning your presentation, you'll want to create visuals that help the audience picture what you are saying. Visuals may be props that you hold up or show or you may create posters or slides to illustrate your ideas. If the audience sees it, they are more likely to understand and remember!

Keep in mind these visual tips from the Top Dawg:

- Think about what you'll show or what you'll do to help your audience "see" your speech.
- Make your words and pictures large enough to see from the back of the room.
- Say more with less: Pick 10 strong words instead of 20 weak words.
- Visual aids should attract the audience's attention without distracting them from your speech.

Draft your Posters/Slides in the boxes below!



Along with your visuals, YOU are part of the presentation. Begin with a smile, present yourself with enthusiasm, and speak confidently with appropriate volume. For most presentations, nicer school clothes (such as slacks or skirts) are appropriate, but sometimes, your outfit may match the theme of your speech.

Your 4-H adult leaders and older 4-H club members may be available to offer some help with your project as well! They may be experts in your project area, have similar interests in your project, or may be able to listen to your speech while you practice.

Practice makes perfect! Practice your speech so that you are confident in your presentation! Call your local Extension office and ask for help if you need it.




