

PROGRAMMING SNAPSHOT



FORESTRY JUDGING & FIELD DAY

Extension programming during the COVID-19 pandemic provides the opportunity for innovative and non-traditional delivery methods. As a response, Georgia 4-H obtained guidance and permission from UGA to conduct Area and State Forestry Field Days in person in September, 2020. The hybrid reintroduction of programming (offered both in person and virtual) provided an expanse in reach and engagement of youth.

Best practices for in-person gatherings were developed based on guidance provided by the Centers for Disease Control, Georgia Department of Public Health, UGA, and the Governor's Executive Order for Empowering a Healthy Georgia. Some counties were able to hold in-person practices while others were limited to virtual contact.

To meet these broad needs, Georgia 4-H provided five new digital educational tools that youth could access to supplement practices with their teams or learn the material independently. Tree and insect/disease identification practice tools for both junior (grades 4-8) and senior (grades 9-12) divisions were widely used. Three video tutorials on pacing, compass, and volume estimation were developed to teach these skills as well.



Recognizing that many factors could prevent youth from attending either an area or state field day, a virtual state contest was developed. The virtual state contest was open to all 4-H youth, rather than only high school youth, like in previous years, because all ages encountered barriers to participating in area field days.

In-person Area Forestry Field Days were held in all four UGA Extension Districts and the State Forestry Field Day was held at Rock Eagle 4-H Center. Youth, volunteer coaches, and staff repeatedly stated how wonderful it was to be a part of a district or state event in person. All field day participants, coaches, and staff completed health screenings, wore appropriate face coverings, and maintained social distancing in order to safely conduct the field days. Forestry Coaches were appreciative of the new online educational tools and stated they plan to use them even if programming returns to pre-COVID19 times.
