You will find a GA 4-H Military volunteer who is ready to serve just as the Air Force Core Values highlight. Our volunteers live by Service Before Self at work, at home, and as a volunteer.

In Simon Sinek's novel, Leaders Eat Last: why some teams pull together and others don't, (2nd ed.), he writes, a colonel in the Navy has stated that in the Marine Corps, trust and integrity are considered matters of life and death... Leadership is not a rank worn on a collar. It is a responsibility that hinges almost entirely on the character of a person and group. Leadership is about integrity, honesty, and accountability. All components of trust. Leadership comes from telling us not what we want to hear, but rather what we need to hear. To be a true leader, to produce deep trust and loyalty, starts with telling the truth. (Sinek, pp.185-197)
